Checkpoint Strikeforce Unites Region In Combating Drunk Driving

Campaign combines strict checkpoint enforcement, targeted public education

WASHINGTON, DC-At an actual sobriety checkpoint, agencies from across the region joined in kicking off the Checkpoint Strikeforce sobriety checkpoint and public awareness campaign. Throughout the remainder of 2004, the campaign is employing resonant ads in a robust (\$320,650) paid media effort to remind citizens of the many dangers and consequences of impaired driving. Law enforcement agencies are deploying a network of sobriety checkpoints, effectively erasing jurisdictional borders with this key tool to fight drunk driving. Virginia, Maryland, the District of Columbia and other mid-Atlantic states are setting up a minimum of one checkpoint a week.

Special efforts include Fairfax County, which is setting up at least one checkpoint a week solely within the county; the District of Columbia, which is extending the time period of its checkpoints to intercept Happy Hour drunk drivers; and Montgomery County, which mobilized the first of its subsequent checkpoints on August 27.

In its third year, Checkpoint Strikeforce, in tandem with other DUI efforts, is showing early signs of making a difference. Following a series of alarming increases in drunk driving fatalities, 2003 CHECKPOINT

saw the threejurisdiction area of Virginia-Maryland-

DC experience 679 alcohol related traffic fatalities, precisely the same cumulative figure as was recorded in the three jurisdictions in 2002. In 2001, cumulative VA-MD-DC alcohol-related traffic fatalities totaled 668. The recent-year low in drunk driving fatalities for the combined

three jurisdictions was 521 in 1999. (Source: National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. See fact sheet.)

"The strength of Checkpoint Strikeforce is that it unifies all the key elements proven to reduce drunk driving," said Elizabeth A. Baker, regional administrator for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA),

which funds the campaign. "Jurisdictional borders are essentially made moot by the deployment of sobriety

checkpoints across the region. Behavioral changes are motivated by cre-

ative ads tailored to our young male audience and heavily aired on targeted stations. Each element of the campaign reinforces the others.

"The bottom-line message of Check-

Border to Border 2004: Successful For Eighth Year

The Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police in cooperation with law enforcement agencies throughout Virginia and the bordering states of Maryland, West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee and North Carolina completed it's "Border To Border" project September 2, 2004. This was the eight year for the project as part of Virginia's "Smart, Safe and Sober " traffic safety campaign.

This year, 190 law enforcement officers representing 45 agencies held 8 checkpoints with 592 summons or arrests made. Checkpoints were held at the state borders in Giles, Lee, Wise, Pittsylvania, Chesapeake, King George and Frederick Counties. Officers checked traffic for three hours with sister state law enforcement officers beginning at 10:00 AM and ending at 3:00PM. Two of the southwestern counties had rain interfere with the project or greater numbers would have been reported. Participating officers reported the following violations of special interest this year during the 3-hour checkpoints:

- 2 DUI arrests
- 1 Felony Habitual Offender
- 48 Adult Seat Belt Violations
- 41 Speeding Violations
- 2 Reckless Driving Violations
- 9 Child Safety Seat Violations
- 3 Narcotic Violations (65 canine vehicle searches)
- 6 Commercial Motor Vehicle Violations (2 removals from the highway)
- 14 Technician Inspections of CPS (Only 2 were installed correctly)

"We are extremely pleased with the efforts and professionalism of our law enforcement agencies throughout Virginia and in our neighboring states," explained Donald Allen, Traffic Safety Specialist with the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police. "Compared with our efforts last year we issued more summons with many more officers involved this year. Each year the numbers of participants increase as a testament to it's success and popularity with law enforcement officers in Virginia as well as our bordering states. We saw a decrease in the number of adult seat belt violations but saw the same number of child safety seat violations. This is certainly a message to all of us that we need to continue to enforce child safety seat statutes as well as continue the education of parents and caregivers as to proper use and installation of child safety seats."



Transportation Secretary Norman Mineta reports record safety belt usage among Americans on the road

SEATTLE, WA—A record 80 percent of Americans wear their safety belts while driving or riding in their vehicles, U.S. Secretary of Transportation Norman Y. Mineta announced September 16th during a visit to Seattle. The Secretary, while visiting Seattle's Harborview Medical Center, said the number of Americans wearing their safety belts has increased dramatically over the past few years.

"The Bush Administration's unprecedented focus on highway safety has produced a record high percentage of Americans wearing their safety belts and a record low fatality rate," Mineta said.

In the past four years, safety belt use has increased steadily from 71 percent in 2000 to 80 percent this year. The 80 percent safety belt usage will save 15,200 lives and \$50 billion in economic costs associated with traffic related crashes, injuries, and deaths every year, Mineta said.

The Secretary said the success was due in large part to states that have passed primary safety belt laws. Twenty-one states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico have primary safety belt laws that allow police officers to stop a motorist solely for not wearing a safety belt.

The Secretary chose to visit Washington for the announcement to tout its success, noting 94 percent of the state's citizens buckle up. Washington passed a primary seat belt law in 2002 and experienced a 9 percent reduction in overall traffic fatalities since the law was passed, he said.

"It's no coincidence that because 8 out of 10 Americans are wearing their safety belts, we have also achieved the lowest traffic fatality rate on our Nation's highways since record-keeping began 29 years ago," Mineta said.

Today's traffic fatality rate is 1.48 fatalities per 100 million

vehicle miles traveled, a dramatic reduction since 1975 when the rate was 3.35 fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled.

Recognizing that wearing safety belts saves lives and reduces risks of injury and even death, Secretary Mineta, while at Seattle's Harborview Medical Center, met with emergency room staff from the hospital who specialize in trauma injury treatment and prevention.

Secretary Mineta was joined by National Highway Traffic Safety Administrator Dr. Jeffrey Runge and Dr. Frederick Rivara, Director of the Harborview Injury Prevention and Research Center also joined the Secretary for the announcement.

Study finds benefits of electronic stability control

Electronic Stability Control (ESC) systems appear to be effective in reducing the number of single-vehicle crashes, including rollovers, according to a preliminary study by the U. S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). The technology has proved particularly effective for sport utility vehicles (SUVs), the study found.

In 2003, 7.4 percent of the light vehicle fleet was sold with some form of ESC. The systems can improve a vehicle's stability by electronically assisting drivers in dangerous situations. In most vehicles, the ESC system improves the vehicle's lateral stability and, at the same time, electronically combines the attributes of anti-lock brakes and traction control systems to help a driver avoid a potentially dangerous situation.

Among vehicles in the NHTSA study, ESC reduced single vehicle crashes in passenger cars by 35 percent when compared to the same models sold in prior years without the technology. The preliminary results were even more dramatic for the much smaller sample of SUVs in the study: Single vehicle crashes were reduced by 67 percent in models with ESC. Evaluat-

ing fatal crashes only, ESC was associated with a 30 percent reduction for passenger cars, 63 percent for SUVs.

"This technology appears to provide safety benefits by reducing the number of crashes due to driver error and loss of control because it has the potential to anticipate situations leading up to some crashes before they occur and automatically intervene to assist the driver...," according to the study.

NHTSA evaluated the technology by studying fatal and non-fatal crashes from 1997-2003. The study examined crash statistics only for vehicles equipped with ESC as standard equipment. The agency emphasized that the results are preliminary and that it will have more confidence in the effectiveness of ESC when studies can evaluate a larger cross-section of the vehicle fleet.

Williams Receives First IASIU Virginia Chapter Distinguished Service Award

RICHMOND, Va.—The Virginia Chapter of the International Association of Special Investigation Units (VAIASIU) awarded its first Robert J. Covington Distinguished Service Award to Capt. Frank A. Williams, commander of the Special Services Division (SSD) of the Virginia State Police.

The service award, given in recognition of outstanding leadership and commitment in the fight against insurance fraud, was presented to Williams during the VAIASIU annual fraud seminar held at the Holiday Inn Koger Center in Richmond, May 12. Prior to heading up the SSD, Williams was the commander of the Virginia State Police Insurance Fraud Division (IFD) and assistant director of the Bureau of Criminal Investigations.

"Under Capt. Williams' leadership, the IFD and Virginia made significant inroads in the fight against insurance fraud," said Wade Wickre, VAIASIU president. "Capt. Williams exemplifies the ideals of the IASIU

and fighting insurance fraud."

Williams had been at the helm of the IFD since it was established by the General Assembly January 1, 1999. In five years, the Division's efforts have resulted in more than \$10 million in court-ordered restitution and 475 insurance fraud and related arrests. Williams was responsible for implementing the "Stamp out Fraud" awareness program, toll-free hotline and the www.stampoutfrand.com Web site. The "Sharp Eye" reward program for reporting insurance fraud was launched in 2003.

Williams came to the IFD from the Criminal Intelligence Division, where he served as Commander from 1996-1998. For about 10 years prior to that, he was the Chief Arson Investigator and senior explosives technician with the General Investigations Division of the Virginia State Police. Williams holds a master's degree in public administration and a bachelor's degree in administration of justice,



both from VCU.

"The decision was unanimous that the first recipient of this award should be Capt. Williams," explained Rocky Womble, chairman of the VA IASIU awards committee and an investigator with Virginia Mutual Insurance.


The award was named for Robert J. Covington, an associate vice president for Virginia Mutual Insurance, in honor of his service and work with the VAIASIU. He was instrumental in the formation of the VAIASIU and remained active in the organization until his death in 1998.

NHTSA Brings Focus to Child Safety Issue

Booster seat use low among young children

The U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) today released results of a major survey showing that relatively few children who should be riding in booster seats are doing so. The findings come in conjunction with the launch of a new national education campaign today to increase booster seat use.

The nationwide telephone survey indicates that just 21 percent of children age four to eight are "at least on occasion" riding in a booster seat while traveling in a passenger vehicle. Another 19 percent of children in this age range were restrained "at least on occasion" in a front-facing child safety seat.

"This survey supports what our crash statistics imply, that children are at unnecessary risk of being injured in crashes because they are either in the wrong restraint for their size, or worse, totally unrestrained," Dr. Runge said. "Children are not only safer, but more comfortable in a safety belt that fits, and that's what a booster seat provides."

Results of the latest survey, which cover a variety of traffic safety issues involving children, were released today by NHTSA Administrator Jeffrey W. Runge, M.D., at a news conference in the Houston suburb of Pasadena. The event marked the launch of a new national campaign to increase booster seat use, called "Boost for Life," which is being led by the National Automobile Dealers Association (NADA).

Children who have outgrown their child safety seat should ride in a booster seat until they are at least eight years old or 4 feet, 9 inches tall, according to NHTSA. Children placed in poorly fitting adult safety belts can suffer serious life-threatening injuries, or risk being ejected from a vehicle altogether in the event of a crash.

NHTSA's new research findings on child passenger safety are drawn from a national survey conducted by the agency on a biannual basis to monitor the public's attitudes, knowledge, and self-reported behavior regarding safety belts, air bags, crash injury experience, and emergency medical services. In addition to its findings on booster seat use, the new survey results provide an array of information on other child passenger safety issues.

Findings of the newly released survey were derived from two telephone questionnaires, each administered to a randomly selected sample of about 6,000 persons age 16 and older. The interviewing was conducted between January and March of 2003.

According to the survey, 85 percent of the parents and caregivers of young children had heard of booster seats. Among those who were aware of booster seats, 60 percent said they had used them "at some time" with their children.

Dr. Runge lauded the National Automobile Dealers Association for leading the new "Boost for Life" campaign. The campaign, to begin in October with the support of NHTSA, will involve public awareness efforts by dealerships throughout the country. Dealers will conduct child safety seat inspection programs for the public and will distribute at least 5,000 NHTSA brochures to promote booster seat use. NADA represents about 20,000 franchised new car and truck dealers.

"Education is one of our most effective tools for ensuring the safety of children in motor vehicles," Dr. Runge said.

point Strikeforce is as simple as it is serious: If you drink and drive, you WILL get caught."

Studies show that sobriety checkpoints can reduce alcohol-related crashes by as much as 20 percent. Using sobriety checkpoints and patrols, when and where drunk driving is most likely to occur, checkpoints deter motorists from driving under the influence and arrests those who do drink and drive.

Checkpoint Strikeforce's creative radio ads, which will run until the end of the year, are designed specifically to hit home with the target audience of 21-to-35-year-old males – a hard-to-reach audience that is statistically most at risk for drunk driving. Of all fatal crashes, drivers in this age group have the highest incidence of intoxication – approaching double the rate of teenagers and drivers 45 and older. (Source: NHTSA)

The first ad, "Mom," is a 60 second vignette of a 24-year old guy who has to rely on his mother to drive him everywhere because he

lost his license after getting caught at a sobriety checkpoint.
